

"Pan" means pot (normal type), 'Long Tom', half-pot, seed pan, square pot etc., clay or plastic materials.

Plants need not be pot grown, and may be lifted and potted for showing.

Good preparation of plants will count favourably:

- i) Make sure containers are clean. Remove weeds from pots; carefully remove dead, dying or discoloured or damaged flowers and foliage. Plants may be enhanced by dressing soil with gravel or other suitable material.
- ii) Plants should be clearly named with a horizontal label, which may be hand written or mechanically printed. Additional information, where required in the schedule, must be given.

SCHEDULE NOTES

1 a) "Separate genera" = one Primula, one Dianthus etc.

b) "Separate species" - examples:

Class 2; Fritillaria/ Narcissus/ Tulipa or Narcissus rupicola/ N.cyclamineus/ N.watieri

Class 4; Primula/ Dianthus/ Viola or Primula marginata/ P.farinosa/ P.vulgaris

2 Includes Anagallis, Androsace, Cortusa, Cyclamen, Dionysia, Dodecatheon, Douglasia, Lysimachia, Omphalogramma, Primula, Soldanella, Trientalis, Vitaliana.

3 Classes for bulbous plants are for true bulbs (monocotyledons with swollen rootstock) and exclude those listed in note 4. Bulbs are to be found in: Allium, Arum, Arisaema, Calochortus, Colchicum, Crocus, Erythronium, Fritillaria, Galanthus, Iris, Leucojum, Merendera, Muscari, Narcissus, Pinellia, Romulea, Scilla, Sternbergia, Tecophilea, Tulipa etc.. If in doubt, please check with Show Secretary.

4 Includes Cyclamen, most Corydalis (some are fibrous rooted, and do not qualify for class 9), Ranunculus (asiaticus, ficaria), Oxalis, Anemone (tuberous), rhizomatous Iris, Orchidaceae, etc..

5 Judged on the quality of the cushion; need not be in flower.

6 e.g. Turkey (East of Bosphorus), Central Asian States (Tadjikistan, Uzbekistan etc.), Siberia, China, Japan etc..

7 e.g. Argentina/Chile/Peru(Andes), Australia, Falkland Islands, South Africa, New Zealand etc.

8 Includes (in addition to dwarf Rhododendron) - Andromeda, Arctica, Arctostaphylos, Calluna, Cassiope, Epigaea, Erica, Gaultheria, Kalmia, Ledum, Leiophyllum, Pernettya, Phyllodoce, Rhodothamnus, Vaccinium, etc.

9 In respect of conifers, rhododendrons and shrubs, "dwarf" means naturally small. Large growing species which are unsuitable for the rock garden will not be disqualified but may not be favourably regarded by judges.
