Our speaker this month is Dr. Andrew Ward.

Andrew trained as a plant breeder and started 'Norwell Nurseries and Gardens' in Nottingham with his wife Helen 24 years ago. It is a small nursery specialising in choice and unusual herbaceous perennials and alpines. Based around a 1 acre plantsman's garden it holds over 2,500 different species and 2 National Collections, Hardy Chrysanthemums and Astrantias.

The garden has featured in many Country and Garden Magazines and is also included in 'Great Gardens to Visit'.

Andrew's talk is entitled 'Shady Characters' which includes many of the rarer and more unusual shade loving plants.

Early Spring Show 2020

At the AGM a member asked 'What defines an Alpine Plant'? The following article may help anyone not sure what to grow and show.

What is an Alpine?

The technical definition of an alpine plant is one which occurs at high elevation and above the tree line. If we, as growers, were to limit ourselves to these plants, we would have a very small number to choose from for our back gardens and greenhouse. The Alpine Garden Society have defined an 'Alpine or rock garden plant' as all plants, including shrubs, suitable for cultivation in a rock garden of moderate size or in an unheated frame or alpine house. It excludes any plant which would not survive an average British winter under such conditions but includes many plants which do not necessarily grow in mountainous regions - so, dwarf, hardy plants.

When it comes to showing plants, suitability comes into play, so we need to modify the AGS definition to say 'wouldn't look out of place on or in a moderate rock garden or pot'; there are plenty of 'big' plants above the tree line on some mountains! 'Over-selected' forms of plants are also excluded; Show Auriculas, Florist Cyclamen, for example (but strangely, we do see a lot of 'double' Hepaticas in the prizes). Ultimately it comes down to what the panel of judges think at the time, hopefully they will follow the guidelines in the show handbook, weigh up the plants on display, use their knowledge of the plants in question and come up with a consistent result by applying an even-handed approach from show to show.

Class 6 - Primula

Novice

maximum size pot/pan 19cm

Class 7 - Any Alpine in flower.

Class 8 - Any alpine, separate genus from 7 (if you have entered that class).

Note—one pot/ pan per class

Exhibitors are eligible to show in the novice section and above until they have been awarded an AGS Bronze Medal or have not won the novice section three times. Exhibitors are eligible to show in the intermediate section and above until they been awarded an AGS Gold Medal or have not won the intermediate section three times.
