### **SATURDAY 12 NOVEMBER 2022**

The Annual General Meeting of the Alpine Garden Society will take place on Saturday 12 November 2022 at Chesford Grange Hotel, Kenilworth.

### **ELECTION OF OFFICERS**

The following Officers are eligible for reappointment and are prepared to continue to serve the AGS (see Note 1 below): Director of Seed (Vacant), Director of Shows (Mr Martin Rogerson), Treasurer (Prof John Galloway) and President (Mr David Morris):

### NOMINATIONS FOR TRUSTEE BOARD MEMBERS

Nominations, with supporting statements/citations, are invited from members for the following posts: Two Trustees to serve for four years; One Trustee to serve for two years; One Trustee to serve for three years (see Note 2 below).

### PROVISIONAL AGENDA

- 1. To receive and confirm the minutes of the last Annual General Meeting, held on 13 November 2021
  - 2. To receive the report of the Board of Trustees
  - 3. To receive the Honorary Treasurer's report and accounts
  - 4. To elect a President, Treasurer and Officers to serve for the ensuing year.
  - 5. To elect trustees to serve for for the relevant period (see above)
    - 6. To appoint Auditors for the ensuing year
- 7. Any Other Items of Business as notified to the Society Director in writing, no later than 31 July 2022.

Notes on the election of Officers and members of the Trustee Board:

- (1) Officers retire annually and are eligible for re-election as per rule 7.1.3.1 of the Constitution. All Honorary Officers listed have agreed to stand for re-election.
- (2) In accordance with rule 7.1.4, two Trustees retire annually and are not eligible for re-election for one year. The deadline for Trustee nominations is 31 July 2022 and these should be sent to the AGS Director Tony Bryan at the AGS Centre (address on page 2).

## **AGS ANNUAL AWARDS**

### NOMINATIONS ARE INVITED FOR THE FOLLOWING AGS AWARDS

- Lyttel Trophy for meritorious work with alpines
- The Sir William & Lady Lawrence Award for a person who works in professional horticulture and who has made a significant contribution in their work with alpines (cultivation, research etc).
- The Award of Honour for sterling work on behalf of the AGS, not necessarily during the previous year, but over a period of time.
- The Ferrier Charlton Award for outstanding work for the Society in an administrative capacity.
- The Kath Dryden Award to recognise meritorious work on basic cultivation and/or new plant introduction within a single genus or group of alpine plants.
- Local Group Awards to recognise outstanding service within a Local Group over a number of years, the impact of which is felt more widely than just the local area. Nominations must come from the Local Group concerned and must be approved by the committee of that Local Group.

The Alpine Gardener sets extremely high standards in horticultural journalism and photography and every year the Society seeks to honour the very best contributions. We do this by appealing to the judgement of the most informed critics - you, the readership. - The Clarence Elliott Memorial Award for the best article published in The Alpine Gardener in 2021 (Volume 89).
- The Lionel & Joyce Bacon Award for the best practical alpine gardening article published in *The Alpine Gardener* in 2021 (Volume 89).
- The Christopher Grey-Wilson Award to recognise photographic excellence in *The Alpine Gardener* in 2021 (Volume 89) for the best 'feature' article that must contain a minimum of ten photographs.

# AGS PHOTOGRAPHIC COMPETITION 2022

# ENTER THE AGS PHOTOGRAPHIC COMPETITION FOR THE CHANCE TO WIN CASH PRIZES AND POINTS TOWARDS AGS ARTISTIC MEDALS.

Last year's competition received lots of entries, possibly because of the later deadline, so the entry deadline for this year will be **24 December 2022**. You can enter three images in each class, but only digital images can be accepted. Images may have been taken this year, but they do not have to be, providing they have not been published and have not been entered previously in this competition.

As a photographic competition, entries will be judged purely on photographic merit. For example, an excellent image of a common plant will rank more highly than a flawed image of a rare plant (even if the rare plant is a superb specimen). Judging is performed by a panel of both current and non-AGS members with appropriate artistic and/or photographic expertise.

There are nine classes:

- CLASS ONE An alpine plant in its natural habitat with both plant(s) and landscape featured.
- CLASS TWO A portrait of an alpine plant in its natural habitat, featuring the entire plant as the main subject.
- CLASS THREE A close-up or detail of an alpine plant in its natural habitat or in cultivation. This doesn't have to be a flower; you could focus on foliage or a seedhead.
- CLASS FOUR An alpine plant in cultivation in a garden setting. It can be in your garden or a garden you have visited.
- CLASS FIVE An alpine plant in cultivation in a pot. This subject allows potentially a great deal more photographic control than plants in the wild: you can control where you take the photo (indoors or outdoors) when you take the photo (when the plant is in perfect condition), and time of day, which gives control over lighting and weather. You can use artificial light sources and backgrounds if you wish.
- CLASS SIX Alpine fauna in the wild, either in the landscape or in association with plants. Insects have been popular subjects in the past, as have birds and mammals.
- CLASS SEVEN An alpine landscape not necessarily showing specific plants but concentrating on the scenic beauty and/or geology of the setting. You could be inspired by unusual natural beauty, from the small and intimate to the grand panorama..
- CLASS EIGHT An imaginative or unusual image featuring alpine plants. Digital manipulation is allowed in this class. In fact, anything goes!
- CLASS NINE The Wonder of Wildflowers. This class is intended to celebrate the visual spectacle that alpine plants can create. We want to see spectacular panoramas of flowers, whether a carpet of a single species or a tapestry of different plants, colours and shapes.

# **SEED EXCHANGE 2022–2023**

### **Seed donations**

New Plant Health regulations now state that all plants and seed entering the UK need to be accompanied by a Phytosanitary Certificate. The charges for this vary greatly between countries, so overseas donors may wish to group together to share any cost involved. We are trying to find a better solution to this ongoing problem.

### Seed lists

We will no longer be posting the seed list to all members. The seed list will be available for online orders in late November 2022, and it will also be possible to download and print a copy from the website from that date if you wish to order by post, although we strongly recommend online ordering if you can do this. If you cannot access the list electronically, we would be very happy to post you a copy. Please contact Diane Clement or the AGS before 1 November 2022 if you would like a seed list by postt.

Seed ordering: overseas members excluding Japan, Australia and the EU Members in countries excluding Japan, Australia and the EU will be able to receive seed this year in the same way as you have done in the past but because of increasing postal costs, there will now be a charge for seed for all members. Members in the USA requiring seed will need to send us an Import Permit by mail or email (obtainable from the USDA website). More information will be provided about this in the September Newsletter and on the AGS website. We are able to send seed to Northern Ireland, Norway and Switzerland...

### Seed ordering: members from Japan, Australia and the EU

Seed entering Japan, Australia and the EU must now be accompanied by a Phytosanitary Certificate which is prohibitively expensive for us to obtain, and therefore currently not appropriate for our seed exchange. We are engaged in trying to plan a route through this new legislation which will be acceptable and manageable for Plant Societies. Realistically this will not happen this year and we will be working towards a change in the future. We are therefore sorry that we will not be able to send seed this year to Japan, Australia or the EU but hope for a change in future years.

# THE ALPINE GARDEN SOCIETY Members' Seed Distribution 2022/23 Instructions for seed donors PLEASE READ ALL INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY

Please pull out these centre pages in full (do not tear at the centre). Complete the form in block capitals and include this form with your seed. A copy of the form is also available on the AGS website.

Make sure the seed is clean and free from chaff, grit, etc. Do not use very large or very small packets as they are difficult to manage and increase the work load of the seed handling team. Seal the packets well and ensure they are leak-proof. Mark each packet clearly with the full name of the seed, your name and the packet number as listed on your donor form. If you do not know the full name of a plant, please include information about height, colour, etc. Donations of small bulbils, corms, etc. are very acceptable.

New regulations now state that all seed donations from outside the UK must be accompanied by a Phytosanitary Certificate. Overseas donors may wish to group together to share any cost involved. We are trying to find a better solution to this ongoing problem.

To qualify for Donor status, you must send in a minimum donation of 7 different varieties of seed, preferably suitable for a rock garden. Family members requiring two orders with Donor status must send in a minimum of 14 different varieties. Please send in your seed to arrive before **10 October 2022**, together with your Seed Donor's form, to the address below which corresponds to your surname.

Late donations: If you think your seed may arrive after the closing date of 10 October, you must contact Diane Clement by email for alternative posting arrangements. Please do not post to the seed receiver listed below after 10 October. We will not be posting out seed lists this year, except by request. Please contact Diane Clement or the AGS before 1 November 2022 if you would like a seed list posted to you.

# S. AFRICA

### 1-15 September 2022 (to/from the UK)

his tour provides a unique opportunity to see the best of the South African Cape spring bulbs, from breathtaking daubenyas to sparkling romuleas.

In this Cape spring tour with a difference, we focus on the dolerites of both the world-famous Roggeveld and Nieuwoudtville areas. There will be the chance to see some beautiful floral displays that the West Coast is famous for. including some rare irids of the wine-growing regions, not usually seen on tours.

We start by heading to the dramatic mountain escarpment area of the Roggeveld, where our main focus will be both the golden and red forms of the incomparable Daubenya aurea (pictured), and well as a host of striking endemic romuleas including the striking pink-flowered Romulea komsbergensis and the orangeyred-bloomed Romulea unifolia.



Heading westwards to the Bokkeveld escarpment at Nieuwoudtville, we plan to see further interesting species, including the graceful flowers of babianas (and hesperanthas, as well as geissorhizas, Sparaxis (harlequin flower), Moraea, (cape tulip) and Gladiolus.

We then go on to explore the Cape west coast and the rich soils of the winelands near Tulbagh which are home to a further dazzling array of floral gems.

# **PELOPONNESE**

### 29 October-7 November 2022

**Leaders**: Christopher Grey-Wilson and Razvan Chisu

Cost: from £1,500 pp including flights to/from London

his tour will concentrate on the bulb wealth in the Peloponnese, but will also take time to examine other species in flower during the autumn, as well as visiting important ancient sites.

This region has some of the most famous archaeological sites in Greece. like Mycenae and the tower houses of Vathia.

Scenically diverse, the area offers the greatest selection of autumnflowering 'bulbs' than anywhere else in the Mediterranean: crocuses. colchicums, cyclamen, narcissi, scillas and even a snowdrop and an onion. Participants will be staying in delightful villages and towns like Gythio and Monemvasia.

The tour starts by exploring the region of Mt Hymettos on the outskirts of Athens; expect first sightings of Cyclamen graecum, Sternbergia lutea. Next day we visit Langada Gorge for Galanthus



reginae-olgae.

The tour continues with a day in the Taygetos Mountains and environs. Then we drive south to **Gytheion**. to visit the Dimitrios wreck and nearby colonies of autumn-flowering Cyclamen araecum. Anemone pavonina and Narcissus tazetta.

The following day is exploring Ariopolis and Stoupa, before we head to Monemvasia, with stops on the Malea peninsula on day 7. A day trip around Monemyasia takes in sites where Crocus aoulimvi. Colchicum cupanii and Crocus boryi abound. The penultimate day visits Nafplio and Mycenae, returning to Athens on the final day.

# **PATAGONIA**

### 28 Nov-18 December 2022 (to/from the UK)

Leader: Martin Sheader Cost: from £8,200 pp inc flights to/from London

atagonia is a remote region that includes the southermost provinces of Argentina and Chile. It has a diverse range of spectacular landscapes, including vast areas of semi-desert steppe to the east and temperate rainforest to the west, separated by the dramatic peaks of the Andes.

This varied landscape supports many plants that are striking in colour, form and habit. Some are in cultivation, but many, especially the alpine and steppe flora, are not. In addition to the flowers, we should see lots of wildlife, notably quanacos, foxes, austral parrots. condors, skunks and armadillos.

We start at San Carlos de Bariloche and visit two mountains. Cerro Catedral and Mirador de Nirihuau, to see Oxalis. violas, Ourisia fragrans and Combera paradoxa.

We then head south to Lago Vinttner with the attraction of steppe and woodland plants, stopping off at La Hoya ski resort



and Esquel for botanising.

The tour also includes botanising on Monte Zeballos. Argentina, which is rich in flowers including rosulate violas, Benthamiella, Hamadryas and many other alpine species.

Next we cross into Chile to Patagonia National Park, a recently protected wilderness that we can explore, and look for Chloraea, Leucheria and Gavilea species. The park encompasses habitats from steppe to lenga forest and wetlands.

The tour finishes with a drive to Comodoro Rivadavia, with stops to botanise en route.

his is the first AGS tour to explore the High Andes in Bolivia. The tour starts in Cochabamba, the third largest city in the country, a perfect place to acclimatise before the expedition to the highlands. We spend the first four days in Cochabamba exploring the areas near Misicuni Lake and National Park Torotoro, considered the most beautiful Bolivian National Park, never explored by botanists. The tour includes three days at the impressive and famous salt lake Salar de Uyuni which is an extremely beautiful landscape full of gigantic cacti and the very colorful Lago Colorado with many pink flamingos. The second part of the tour is focused in botanising for seven days around La Paz. the capital city of this country.



We explore Paso La Cumbre, the surroundings of Nevado Huayna Potosi, the old ski-area Chacaltaya, Canon de las Animas-Illimani and Khara Khota lake. We will also visit the ruins of Tiahuanaco and the Valle de la Luna with its strange rock formations.
